
Kulay Kalingka Study profile

72% people in the Kulay Kalingka Study had not received a cancer diagnosis whereas 28% had.



6 in 10 people believe that cancer is common among Aboriginal and

From July to December 2023, almost 2000 people completed the survey. This is what you told us.





Approximately 80% of people believed that you could develop cancer without having any symptoms present.

For those receiving care for cancer:

- 59% of people found having an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander person assist with interpretation and communication to be helpful
- 52% of people preferred having access to someone who understands culture
- 48% of people liked having an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander person to talk to for support
- 42% of people wanted family members to be present when talking to health professionals



91.4% of eligible people in the Study without a cancer diagnosis have ever participated in breast cancer screening



90.7% of eligible people in the Study without a cancer diagnosis have ever participated in cervical cancer screening



86.4% of eligible people in the Study without a cancer diagnosis have ever participated in bowel cancer screening
